Lindsay Chathli, 36, is married with two children, runs a business from home and has lived in the area 9 years. "As the mother of young children my personal priorities include providing things to do for the kids when they get slightly older," she says. "I'm glad the Conservative councillors ensured that youth provision in Dulwich will get a higher priority in Southwark's plans next year. I also want more secondary school places and a clean, safe environment."



Jessica Mary, 27, was so taken with East Dulwich she bought her first home here. As a regular user of local bus and train services, Jess has campaigned for improved transport links and has contacted Network Rail over planned cuts in train services from nearby Denmark Hill. Tackling crime in East Dulwich is one her top priorities. Jess says, "It's important that people don't feel afraid walking home at night and that parents don't have to worry about their children walking to school."



Stephen Smith, 54, is an accountant who has lived in the area for 25 years. Steve says, "I've loved Lordship Lane since I first came here in 1981 so I'm determined to preserve its unique character. Having five children I'm also very concerned about the environment, whether that means ensuring local streets are clean or making recycling easier for all of us. I want to ensure that Southwark Council focuses on its recycling responsibilities and keeps East Dulwich as litter free as possible."
